Dear Congregants,

I am thrilled to be writing you as the Interim Cantor of Kehillat Ma'arav. When I chose to become a cantor and enrolled at the Jewish Theological Seminary

almost 30 years ago, I dreamed of serving a community that was like my second family, a community of likeminded people who loved Judaism as much as I did, who appreciated the gifts I had to bring, and brought me even more.

I know I cannot replace all that Cantor Sam has brought to this congregation. Rather, my goal is to bring the best of me each and every day.

Two strengths that I bring to the pulpit are first and foremost, my vision for more inclusive Shabbat services. I believe we shine ever brighter the more members we involve in services, as Torah readers, Haftarah readers, daveners, singers, and English readers. If you would like to participate by doing any of these, Covid-permitting, please reach out to me. And, if you've always wanted to learn how to chant Torah or Haftarah, now's the time, even if you don't read Hebrew. Because, the second strength I bring is my decades of experience as an educator. More than my love for Judaism, is my love for teaching it. I hope you will allow me the opportunity to do so.

MY KM: WHY I BELONG

"...we're all very close-knit."

It was during a tax season when Stan, a CPA, came home to his now late-wife, Sandy, who told him

about a group of people getting together to start a new synagogue. Like the Zieglers, they didn't love all aspects of their current synagogues and were looking to create their own. "Sandy wanted me to go to a meeting, but since I was busy with tax season, I couldn't make it," he recalls. "I told her to go and if she thought it was worthwhile, then I'd go to the next meeting."

She thought the people were very warm and nice—a cornerstone of the Kehillat Ma'arav community even today—and the rest is history. They started out meeting

in homes, then in the Brentwood Presbyterian Church. "To this day, every Thanksgiving we have a joint breakfast where we get together here one year and at the church the next to eat, share and sing songs."

Involved from the beginning as synagogue treasurer, Stan would often invite people to experience Kehillat Ma'arav. He introduced one client of his who loved it so much that he joined and became a major donor. "He gave an initial \$1 million gift to the synagogue which went a long way for us to start searching for our building. In addition to his gift, he also helped pay off our mortgages," Stan shares.

One of Stan's favorite things about the synagogue after so many years is seeing the multiple generations together. "I've never been to a place where you find young and elderly people co-mingling so beautifully," he says. "Age doesn't mean a thing; we're all very close-knit."

OLD FASHIONED STUFFED CABBAGE ROLLS

INGREDIENTS:

1 large cabbage

2 pounds lean ground beef

2 medium to large onions

2 tablespoons canola or olive oil

1 cup white or brown rice and 2 cups water

3 eggs

11/2 teaspoons salt

1 teaspoon pepper

2 cans tomato soup

2 small bottles (individual serving sizes) tomato juice or vegetable cocktail (like V8 juice)

1 can or small carton chicken broth

DIRECTIONS:

In the bag that you brought your cabbage home~place the cabbage in the freezer and leave for 12 hours or overnight. Remove and leave to thaw at room temperature. This will take awhile, so I often take it the night before the day I want to make the cabbage rolls. The leaves will be soft and easy to use without having to boil them.

In a small saucepan or a microwave safe covered dish cook the rice. Set aside to cool. The rice can be made the day ahead and kept chilled in the refrigerator overnight.

Chop the onions fine and sauté them slowly until they are golden brown-set aside to cool.

In a large bowl, break apart the ground beef, add the salt, pepper, eggs, onions and the rice. Mix together until combined using your hands.

Remove the leaves from the cabbage, cutting away the tough part closest to the core.

Spray your large casserole or two small casserole dishes with cooking spray.

Put about a 1/3 to 1/2 cup meat mixture at the bottom of the leaf and roll up...the meat amount varies depending on the size of the leaf...repeat until all the meat is used up.

In a large mixing bowl, combine the tomato soup, juice, and broth. Pour evenly over the cabbage rolls. Cover with foil or the lid.

Bake the cabbage rolls slowly at 325 for 2 hours. Serve or cool on the counter. Remove the foil (if you don't, you will have little bits of foil on your cabbage rolls where ever it touches.) Cover with plastic wrap and either refrigerate or freeze.

For reheating-thaw first if frozen. Remove the plastic wrap and cover with a lid or foil and just reheat in the oven for about an hour at 325.
