LET'S EAT!

Apple, Celery Root and Kohlrabi Slaw

Bring this fresh coleslaw variation to your July 4th BBQ!

Prep Time: 7min Servings: 5-6

INGREDIENTS:

1 Granny Smith apple, cut into julienne

1 Lady apple, cut into julienne

1 medium kohlrabi, peeled and cut into julienne

1 small celery root, peeled and cut into julienne

2 celery stalks, cut into very thin bias

1 lemon, juiced and put into 4 cups water to create acidulated water

2 tablespoons of mayonnaise

1 tablespoon honey

2 teaspoons cider vinegar

Kosher salt

Freshly cracked black pepper

Garnishes: pomegranate arils, flat leaf parsley leaves, celery leaves

DIRECTIONS:

1. Place apples, kohlrabi, celery root, and celery into lemon water (acidulated water). (The apples, kohlrabi, celery root and celery may be kept in acidulated water, in refrigerator for up to 1 day before serving.)
2. Whisk mayonnaise, honey, vinegar, salt, and pepper together until smooth. Drain apple mixture and shake off water.
3. Toss apples, kohlrabi, celery root, and celery with vinaigrette. Season with salt and pepper to taste.
4. Garnish with pomegranate arils, parsley leaves, and celery leaves.
5. The finished slaw may be stored, covered, in the refrigerator for up to 6 hours before serving.

IN MEMORY OF

YEHUDIS ROTHSCHILD

Remembered by Ann Harris

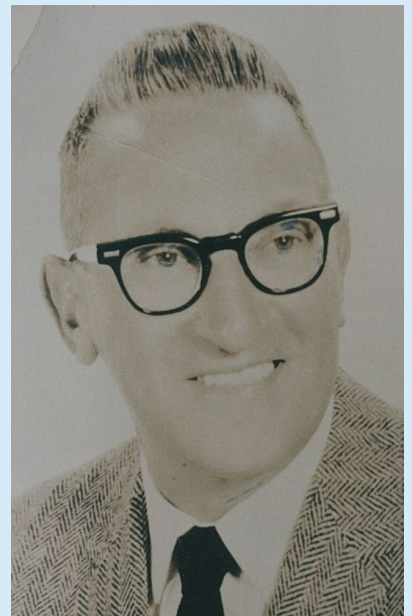


Our sister, Joan (Yehudis Bina) Gleich Rothschild, was the last of four children in our nuclear family. We strongly identified as a foursome. So thinking of us now as a trio is both disconcerting and painful beyond words. Her loss 3 years ago at 65 is still very raw. You can see her essence in this photo, where she is broadly smiling at one of her adored 18 grandchildren. But, being serious was closer to her true nature. She exchanged a degree in biochemistry for a life in Israel as a devoted wife and mother (and high school science teacher) and crusader for the causes she held most dearly. She and Duvid raised 5 exceptional children, who make significant contributions to their own communities, from NY to Israel, to New Delhi, India. Within her legacy of public service, she was a tireless advocate in providing vital resources for pregnant women and their babies. She lived Tikun Olam every day with her kindness and generosity of spirit. She was the pride of her Lubavitch community in Sfat.

SOL STEINBERG

Remembered by Bill Lippman

Sol Steinberg was born October 22, 1904 on the lower East Side of Manhattan, the third sibling of six in a Romanian immigrant family. His father was an itinerant waiter with serious gambling issues, but thankfully his oldest brother Al worked hard to keep the younger siblings afloat. At times they moved monthly to avoid paying rent, and Sol's formal schooling ended with the third grade when he began a series of odd jobs to help support the family, including carrying chairs back and forth to the beach at Coney Island during the summer months. In his late teenage years, he was well on his way to becoming a juvenile delinquent, when his supervisor in his job as a Western Union messenger saw a spark of ambition and arranged for him to begin work at a plumbing supply company. In the subsequent years he would work his way up in that company and shortly after he married our grandmother Betty in 1936, he would cash in his meager life insurance policy and start a new company on his own in 1937. When metal pipes became hugely in demand during WWII, he expanded rapidly and became quite successful, eventually operating several metal supply locations around the country. He was self-educated to an amazing extent, quoting Shakespeare from memory to his daughter and later grandchildren, as well as "borrowing" Bill's college copy of Montaigne's essays for his reading pleasure many years later. In 1950, he and our grandmother made their first of many trips to the State of Israel and fell in love up close with that incredible country. As a chair of the Long Island Jewish Federation, he brought then UN Ambassador Eleanor Roosevelt to speak at a fundraiser supporting Israel in the early sixties, and he also worked actively with the ADL and ORT. Later that decade, he began working with the Israel Education Fund and endowed several community centers and schools in Israel, including the Sol and Betty Steinberg Boarding School in Kfar Saba (which his grandchildren and great-grandchildren continue to support to this day). He loved his vivacious wife Betty, his wonderful only daughter Chickie, and his three grandchildren, Bill, Andrew, & Tamara, who all miss him very much!



GILBERT GOTFRIED *Remembered by Eric Wagreich*



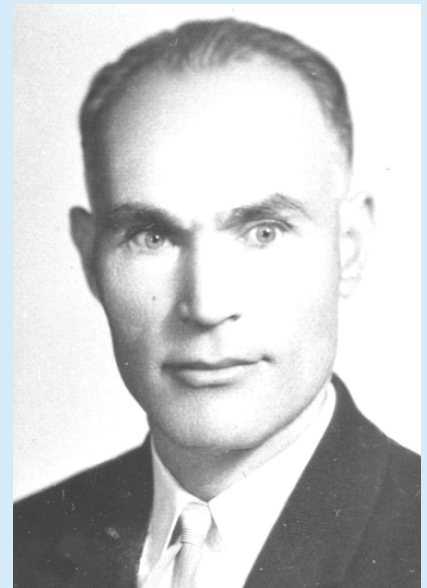
Gilbert Gotfried was born on January 26, 1925 in Williamsburg Brooklyn before it was a hip place to live. He had one sister, Kitty.

After high school, he attended community college, but was drafted to serve in World War II. Because of his typing skills, he became company clerk and was stationed in England for training with a bakery outfit. They followed the troops as they fought the Germans in France, and then in Holland. After the war, he returned to New York to attend Brooklyn College where he majored in mathematics. There he met Roz, whom he would be married to for 72 wonderful years. He got his master's degree at Columbia Teachers College and worked as a math teacher, chairman, and eventually assistant principal, retiring in 1983. Gil and Roz had 2 daughters, 4 grandchildren, and 5 great-grandchildren. Gil was a loving man with a fantastic sense of humor. He loved to laugh and never took life too seriously. Gil's smile could light up the room. His favorite food was spaghetti and meatballs, though he would happily dispose of any leftovers. While Gil suffered from Alzheimer's Disease for his final three years, he still loved a good laugh and to be by his beloved's side until his death on July 25, 2022. He was 97.

MORAD YADEGAR *Remembered by Joseph Yadegar*

Our father, Morad (Mordechai) Yadegar, was a man of great integrity with a gentle heart and kind soul. He was born in 1914 in the Jewish quarter of Esfahan, Iran – a city pioneered by Jews after the destruction of the First Temple. He was the oldest son of a modest family, with three sisters and one brother. Morad studied and learned French at a Jewish school established by the Alliance Israelite Universelle of France; he was one of the few educated Jews in Esfahan at the time. At age 16, he received a full scholarship to attend a higher education program in Paris, but then tragically lost his father and his younger brother. This was a profound tragedy for him and his entire family, and he decided to forego his aspirations of higher education to take care of his mother and sisters. In his early 20s he became one of the few Jews working for the government in the Treasury Department. Despite the prevailing anti-Semitism in Iran, he was promoted to manage the newly built wheat silo during the WWII famine. Well established and on the verge of marrying the love of his life, Esther, he tragically lost his mother in a car accident which delayed his marriage to 1945. In 1946, Esther, Mordechi, and his sisters left Esfahan with their first child and relocated to Tehran, where Morad established a pharmaceutical import business. Soon after Israeli independence in 1948, Morad helped marry his three sisters and supported their immigration to Israel. In 1985, due to the Islamic Revolution, Morad and his wife left Iran for the UK and the following year immigrated to the US, where he reunited with his six children. He fulfilled his dream of being in a free country with his children.

Morad was a family man. As a father, he prepared his children for school with a homemade breakfast and helped them with their homework. He valued education, and arranged for his children to pursue higher education in the UK and US. As a grandfather, he picked up his grandchildren from school and made them after-school snacks. He was the head of the Shabbat dinner table, where he brought the family together every Friday night. He was also considered the core of the family in Israel, where his three sisters grew to over 200 family members. Morad Yadegar passed away in 2009. He was a man of dignity, virtue, and humility. His true wealth was in his generous heart, and what endless wealth he did have.
