LET'S EAT! OVEN "GRILLED" Caan Orababa

Don't have access to an outdoor grill? No problem! This summertime classic - vegan kebabs - turns out just as delicious when cooked in the oven.

Cook Time: 20min | Prep Time: 8min Servings: 8 Kabobs

INGREDIENTS:

Equipment

Skewer sticks

Ingredients

l package Curry Nuggets Hodo Food Brand (or other vegan meat alternative)

½ red onion chopped into large pieces

1 red pepper chopped into large pieces

1 green pepper chopped into large pieces

1 cup baby bella mushrooms

16 cherry tomatoes yellow or red

1 tbsp olive oil

a dash of salt and pepper or whatever other seasoning you'd like to use

DIRECTIONS:

1. Preheat the oven to 425°F. Line a baking tray with parchment paper and set aside.

2. Ensure all of your veggies are chopped to the appropriate size. You want them to be large enough that they stay on the skewers, but not so large that they cannot be eaten in 1-2 bites.

3. Add the veggies and vegan meat alternative in whatever pattern you'd like. You can also add the vegetables randomly, but a pattern helps to ensure that you add them somewhat evenly and don't end up with a stick just filled with one vegetable. Repeat for all 8 sticks.

4. Arrange the sticks on the baking tray.

5. Lightly brush all of the vegetables with the olive oil so that they are coated on all sides.

6. Sprinkle the salt and pepper on top of all of the skewers and then add whatever other seasoning you'd like to add.

7. Place the tray in the oven and bake for 20 minutes.

8. Remove from the oven and let cool for 3-4 minutes before digging in!

IN MEMORY OF Rita Schreiber Remembered by Barbara Goldstone

Rita was a lifelong Ohio girl revealed in her email "buckeyebelle" and unwavering support for the Cincinnati Reds and the Ohio State Buckeyes. She, her parents, and two brothers became California residents in the late 1950s. In Cincinnati, our parents were neighbors so we saw each other occasionally as we grew up in Los Angeles. Unfortunately, their family lost their lovely home in the Brentwood fire, but they stayed on the Westside. Rita and I reunited at the Pomegranate Guild, a Jewish needlework organization. She was a very talented needle worker, a voracious reader (participating in several book groups), a fine and creative cook, an avid sports fan, a willing and frequent volunteer at KM and, above all, a generous and faithful friend. Working primarily as a medical office manager, her love for Israel took her there on numerous vacation visits. After her father passed away, she cared for her mother through the rest of her life. Rita proved the undeniable value of lifelong friendships.

Moe Weissman Remembered by Barry Zwang-Weissman

My father, Moe Weissman z"l, was born in New York City in 1907, the third child of Arthur and Mary (née Eisinger) Weissman, both of whom had immigrated from Czernowitz, at that time in eastern Austria. Family legend has it that Arthur (then Aron) took his mother's surname to escape the Austrian army draft and/or because his parents' marriage was rabbinic so not officially recognized; Aron's father's name was probably Moses Auerbach. Aron arrived in New York about 1900, married in 1902, and was a paper hanger, then house painter, then paint salesman and union officer. Mary died of pneumonia in 1912; Arthur married Rose (née Ellenberg), also from Czernowitz, in 1915 and they had two additional children. Moe is the seated young man on the left of the family portrait; Arthur & Rose are at the upper right.

My father told me he had played stickball on NY streets with Lou Gehrig and Hank Greenberg. He was a lifelong Giants fan, with fond memories of the Polo Grounds. On the way to college, he was diverted by friends to go to law school (New York Law, class of 1931). After only a short time in practice, he had to take over the family "business" when Arthur fell ill. Moe supported his family and helped his younger brother and sister through law school. He moved to California about 1947 where he met my mother. I knew him as a truly kind and generous man but he was not successful in several businesses. He eventually worked as a technical writer for Douglas and then Litton Aircraft until he could retire and move to Florida. I am sure he would have been very proud of both our children, and pleased to see his great grandchildren growing up strong.
